YORKSHIRE MEN Mouth-watering 'friendly' against 2020protour team at Rotherham

Big challenge ahead for 'new' squad

here's a real sense of a changing-of-the-guard as the Yorkshire Men's team gears up for the 2024 season, with a mouth-watering match against the 2020protour stars at Rotherham on Monday April 8 first up.

Captain David Appleyard's off-season plans haven't been helped by coaching sessions being lost due to the weather, as his men - and boys in some cases - look to repeat their stellar performances of

A fantastic second-round comeback sneaked the Northern title away from Cheshire on the Isle of Man, before a tense, rain-soaked victory at the England County Championships at Southport & Ainsdale.

New faces are certain as Applevard takes stock of changed circumstances.

"The plan is to hopefully continue the success that we had in 2023 and maintain and build on that," he said.

"We've obviously lost George Ash and Josh Berry to the pro ranks, while Max Berrisford has gone to America to flight school, to try get his commercial pilot's licence. We've lost Max until the middle of the year.

"And then there are demands on players who did well last year, Tom Osborne, Jack Whaley's at college in the States, Ben Brown with being the English Amateur champion - their time and commitments might change this year depending on what

"That's where we are but in a sense it's good for Yorkshire because it shows that we're doing something right and our players are producing in the amateur game It shows that what we're doing at the coaching level and in the background is helping them achieve their

"We've brought a number of people into the coaching set-up, some of the juniors

who are now on the men's radar, so players like Jack Northgraves, Jake Wallis, George Hanson - we've invited them to come along to the winter coaching sessions so that we can keep an eye on them and bring them into the team environment.

"We've also invited Dan Norman from Teesside, Sam Claypole came the other week - he had a great season last year winning the Leeds Player of the Year and Matchplay title. Habib Khan from the Huddersfield area had a good season so we've broadened our net a little bit and involved more people, because we know potentially we might not have all the top players available for all the matches. We need to make sure our squad is big enough to cover those demands.'

Regarding the 2020protour match at Rotherham, he said: 'It's something that Adam Walker approached myself

and Jonathan [Plaxton] about at the end of last year. We found a date and thought it would be a good way to get the boys a competitive fixture and get them ready for 10 days later when we face Lincolnshire in a competitive

"It gives us a chance to give some of the people we've brought into the winter coaching a chance to see how they do.
"It's good to play against

professionals and our players can see where their game is compared to the pros on the 2020 tour. I'd like to think it could continue for some years to come.

The contest will be six fourball better ball matches, but all games will play 18 holes, with an aggregate score deciding the outcome.

YORKSHIRE SENIORS 2022 champs hungry for success after Isle of Man disappointment

Captain King's plan for 2024...

There's a big year ahead for Yorkshire Seniors Captain Andy King, as he sets about trying to bring home yet another Northern Counties title for Yorkshire and win back the national title, while juggling his management responsibilities with England. Oh, and he'd quite like to get a few rounds of golf in himself!

There was heartache for the reigning champs at the Northern Qualifiers on the Isle of Man last year. After being seven shots behind Durham at lunch, Yorkshire fell an agonising 2-strokes shy of a return to the nationals.

"We ended up being the [Northern Counties] champions which was fantastic, again, and it put us in good spirits for the big tournament on the Isle of Man," recalled the Garforth member.

"That was a week long adventure! We play the 36-holes at Castletown in one day but with it being in the Isle of Man we ended up leaving on the Monday morning and not getting home until the Friday night."

He described the experience of mixing with the Yorkshire Men who were in competition on the island at Mount Murray and said: "It



was great to share with them their success the day before our event."

Of the big day itself, he went on: "We were some shots behind after the morning ... but the guys played really well and with three or four holes left to go it was wide open. Unfortunately we came up just short at the tricky short 18th.


"It's been remodelled and they've brought the sea into play with a ravine in front of the green and depending on the wind and where you put your ball it can be anything from a 9iron to a 6-iron. It becomes quite a daunting second shot."

Normally just a hazard, it was declared out of bounds and it cost Yorkshire dear with two doubles and a bogey on the last. Durham's last man out held his nerve, closing parbirdie-bogey to seal the win.

"Obviously we were bitterly disappointed, but we came up just short," said King. "That's something for this year. We want to have the team ready to go, be ready for Newcastle [this year's venue] and we'll be back to a more traditional format, going up the day before to practice then the tournament the next day."

Reflecting on 2023, the Captain had high praise for Seniors Champion Frank Greaves.

"Frank has been a squad player for some years but he was the [County Seniors] cham-



pion and he forced his way into the team and did himself proud. He played in the Champion of Champions down at Woodhall Spa and that's what players have got to – stand up, and if they are playing well at events and in tournaments, then they'll get a chance."

The squad was missing a couple of stalwarts last year in past county champion Dave

Sanby and a seasoned performer in Stephen East, who were both were injured for most of last year. Thankfully they're both fit and raring to go so we'll welcome them back," said the skipper.

"Johnny Lawrence, a past champion, was busy with his captaincy year at Moor Allerton, so we'll welcome him back too."

He also pointed to quality golfers approaching the 55th birthday threshold: "The likes of Nick Wylde from Garforth, Barry Hardcastle from Wike Ridge, Warren Lockett from Fixby ... they should be coming into consideration."

King thanked the YUGC for providing a coaching budget for the seniors, with players getting fitness training through the winter and a session with coach Steve Robinson is on the cards, looking at short game and tournament prep.

There's a pre-season squad session at Scarcroft and a friendly against Lincolnshire at Brough, before the season opener – against the old enemy Lancashire at Royal Lytham and St Anne's.

"Obviously everyone is wanting to play in that game!"

Asked if that could be the season decider, in round one, he was adamant not.

"No it isn't. Durham will be buoyed by their success, Cheshire have some outstanding players, Northumberland – all of them, it's become a lot closer, a lot more competitive, and yes the Lancashire game is special, we're



the two biggest counties and it's a big start to the season, but everybody's in with a shout. That's my view."

The selectors this year will be King and long-time county administrator John Grimbleby, assisted if required by YUGC Secretary Jonathan Plaxton. King's 'sidekick' Garry Cuthbert will still be involved with assisting the team but wants to focus on his own playing this season.

"It was a big year for Yorkshire's senior

golfers in that the county got behind the new team championships, they introduced a new matchplay event, we had the English Senior Championships up here at Alwoodley – and while we didn't have a winner, a lot of the Yorkshire players competed and did well.

"Hessle and Garforth both ran [scratch] seniors events and I think both clubs were really pleased with the turn-out and both are staging them again this year ... I'm hoping our players will go out and show what they can do."

There's also the prospect of international recognition. King was called up to assist the England Seniors team last year.

"There's so much happening, lots of big tournaments, national competitions and the prospect of getting to play for your country. It's a great experience being involved with England and playing abroad.

"Richard Jones was part of the England team that won the European title in the Czech Republic, plus being part of the mixed team winning the Home Internationals at West Kilbride"

It all sounds rather exhausting, but apparently not.

"I thoroughly enjoyed last year," he said.
"It is a bit of a juggle between playing, doing the captaincy and the managerial bit – obviously the England job is a non-playing role, so there's a little bit of 'not playing' while away with that – but I've been trying to take




on the exercises and keep-fit routines the lads have been given.

"I'm looking forward to the season personally and want to give it another go.

"But we have a big year ahead of us and we've got to focus on going and winning back the English county title!"

Captain takes one for the team

Adam Walker, the inspiration behind a challenge match against Yorkshire's best amateurs, was 'shamed' into dropping himself to first reserve after receiving an offer he couldn't refuse.

Walker had already named his 12-man team for the match versus Yorkshire Men at Rotherham on Monday April 8th, when he got a message from Dan Brown, pleading for a spot.

"I told him 'if you win this weekend I'll drop out'," said Walker. At that point Brown, who had won his first DP World Tour event at the ISPS Handa World Invitational last summer, was joint leader of the SDC Championship in South Africa going into the final round.

Unfortunately things didn't go his way and he finished in a still-respectable tie for 4th. But rather than getting to breathe a sigh of relief Walker, who was a County steadfast for Yorkshire

Captain David Appleyard until turning pro in the middle of last year, just got more earache from Dan, whose younger brother Ben is one of Yorkshire's top performers and in the Men's team.

"It's stupid of me not to put him in after he keeps pester-ing," said Walker, who had raised the prospect of such a pre-season match with Yorkshire officials even since he and Chris Hanson

Brown joins a star-studded professional crew which includes just one non-Yorkshire man - Marco Penge - and with more than 200 county appearances between them

Besides Penge and Dan Brown, there is six time European Tour winner Simon Dyson, John Parry, Hanson and Nick Marsh.

The team has a very strong South Yorkshire flavour with George Mason (Wath), George Ash, Sam Bairstow (both Hallowes). Sheffield man and Kenyan Open run-



The Ladies Pro Series was launched on Friday March 8 by the Yorkshire Men's stalwart – who returned to the professional ranks last summer – and has been doing instruction at the Invictus Golf Studio. Walker has form with successful professional and pro-am events via the 2020protour he co-founded with Chris Hanson.

So far the Ladies Pro Series has scheduled six events all with a £10,000 prize purse, but hopes to add more as sponsors and business partners are recruited. The venues are yet to be announced for tournaments whose format will see each professional paired with an amateur partner, with prizes for both the pro's individual score, as well as the combined team total.

The tour's 2024 schedule





has been designed to complement the existing Ladies European Tour Access Series, with no clashes of dates in a six-event season, with more to be added that initially runs between April and August.

Following the conclusion of the season, options are currently being explored for tournaments to take place in the Middle East at the end of the year, creating playing opportunities for developmental golfers to enjoy.

In an industry press release,

the Walkers said: "Women's sport is rightly growing across the board. Golf is no different and we want to give ladies the chance to compete year-round with comparable prize funds to the men.

"The standard of women's golf in the UK is exemplary and we want to showcase this and help them develop their game, so they are ready to compete at the highest level.

"Having two young daughters ourselves and having a sporting background we want them to grow up in a world where sport is fair and accessible for all, and we are excited to be a part of the journey."

With ease of access and a developmental spirit in mind, the tour sees comparatively lower entry fees than many professional events, with a pro's purse of £10,000 for all events in its first year.

Golfers succeeding in the series will enjoy opportunities to earn a higher amount than on all existing female tours at this developmental level.

The ambitions of the tour will be for it to become an official feeder series for the existing structure within ladies professional golf; notably, providing a pathway into the Ladies European Tour Access Series.

The first event will take place the week commencing April 29 with the remaining tournaments held at venues across England, again helping to make the series more accessible.

Willett's fitness race for Augusta

Yorkshire's first Major winner, Danny Willett, is facing a race against time with the 2024 running of The Masters looming.

The first Major of the year at Augusta National begins on April 11 and Willett, the 2016 champion, is still recovering from shoulder surgery.

He had been nursing a damaged shoulder and was playing the BMW PGA Championship at Wentworth in September. Willett won the tournament in 2019 and had played the first 12 holes in 6-under when his tee shot on the 15th exacerbated the muscle tear. He had surgery shortly after and is busy with his rehab.

Speaking at a Prostate Cancer UK charity event at The Belfry he said that he's back hitting balls. Willett will be in Augusta as a former champion anyway, but hopes to be able to compete. "It will be very very close," he told journalists.

He said: "The beauty of potentially playing is the fact that I know the golf course that well I'm probably not going to be slogging around 18 holes on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in practice rounds.

"I'll be able to take it a little bit easier but I also don't want to go there and



just make up the numbers."

Injuries have plagued the Rotherham golfer since he won the Masters on a day when leader and hot favourite Jordan Spieth fell apart on the Sunday afternoon, although Willett has also won two other events besides the BMW, in Scotland and Dubai.

Surgeons found more shoulder damage than Willett had been aware of, but the 36-year-old said he hopes that once recovered he can enjoy "another 10 or 15 years" of competitive golf.

He has been an ambassador of Prostate Cancer UK for four years, raising tens of thousands of pounds in the process.

A 'forgotten Fowler'

It is not every day you discover that your golf course was designed by one of the world's leading architects but this has just happened at Keighley Golf Club.

The name WH Fowler had been included in some short notes on the club's history page, and just how involved the great designer actually was came as a complete shock to the club's Chairman Simon Tabel.

The information was discovered in a booklet from 1927 that was found in the club's attic, but the importance hadn't been understood when some of it was replicated on their website.

"When I saw Herbert Fowler's name I realised immediately that this was hugely significant," said Tabel.

"I've been a member for 33 years and no one has ever identified the architect responsible for the course – it's a fantastic discovery."

The records reveal that Fowler, who by then had designed a number of top UK courses including Walton Heath, The Berkshire and, closer to home, Bradford Golf Club, as well as several top tracks in the USA, was engaged by the club in 1922 and completed a redesign that included five new holes.

"He returned to the club to explain his changes to an Extraordinary General Meeting and this, and the £900 cost for the works was approved, with work com-



pleted in 1923."

The course layout is almost identical 100 years later with several design features still obvious.

"Fowler liked long accurate driving," added Tabel, "and many of our par fours are well over 400 yards. There is also mounding and grass bunkers which are typical, and the course uses the natural contours of the land."


The competitors in the YUGC 6th Division Team Championship will discover the delights of this 'forgotten Fowler' in May when Keighley plays host. The club also stages three Bradford Union events this season.

Tabel concluded: "We've always known it's a good course, now we can proudly say that we are we were designed by one of the best!"

LAIBOUR OF LOVE

lan Key is a man with a plan. And then, when he's brought that plan to life, he has another plan ready in waiting. Where Burstwick Country Golf is concerned, Key is a veritable golfing ball of fire, warming up everything and everyone around him. The flames certainly burn brightly at the club set in rural countryside to the east of Hull.

It's 20 years since the 3-handicapper, now aged 38, was leaving 6th Form just as his farmer dad David was leaving the troubled agricultural sector behind and throwing everything behind a new golf project. It was no an uncommon theme at the time.

While Alan headed off to spend four years at Askham Bryan Agricultural College in York to hone his skills as a greenkeeper, dad David was making one inspirational decision – to appoint lauded golf architect Jonathan Gaunt as his course designer.

The greens and bunker complexes, plus

The greens and bunker complexes, plus six water hazards dotted around the course, ensure that the biggest hitters will be kept honest around an easy-walking track coming in at 6147 yards off whites and 5780 yards (yellows) for a par of 70, with just a single par-5 and pair of par-3s on each nine.

Burstwick built its first 9-holes in 2003 along with a driving range which has been very much developed since, and which comes into its own during periods like the past four or five months when courses

have basically been underwater. More on that shortly.

The 18-hole layout was duly completed under Gaunt's supervision and the Key family set about trying to build a golf business from scratch. It wasn't always an easy journey.

"There were a few times when we were very close to the brink," admitted Alan Key, who these days is happy to jump on a mower and help the greenkeeping team out, but is the beating heart of everything Burstwick, running the club, overseeing marketing and pulling a pint or two as required. Wife Laura is busy behind her desk, scrutinising the books and handling accounts.

"Looking back, I think we didn't know enough about golf when we started. We should have spent two or three years getting to understand more about the golf industry."

As in most aspects of life, there's no substitute for hard work and total commitment – and for putting your money where your heart and soul is.

On a bright and sunny – if cold – early

Burstwick Country Golf has the Key to success...

March Monday after another spell of rainenforced closures, Burstwick is buzzing. Its 'Nineteen' restaurant has a steady flow of customers and is a dedicated business in its own right, with the Keys keeping hospitality firmly in-house, employing three chefs.

Outside, an area under construction will be a west-facing patio by the summer. "We get great sunsets!" enthuses Key, whose passion for everything golf now extends to a role on the Operations Committee of the East Riding Union, the reigning Inter-District champions.

But as much as golfers are going out and navigating a course Key describes as "young parkland, that's a bit linksy in parts – particularly holes three through 11", the adjacent driving range is a hive of activity.

The 12 bays face down a 300-yard target, but the decision to equip every one with Top Tracer technology has paid off in spades, especially during this wet winter. What's more, unlike the vast majority of ranges, Burstwick has invested in top quality compressed balls, ensuring that the

numbers golfers are fed back from the various programmes at their fingertips accurately resemble the shots they have hit.

Regular users can sign up for monthly challenge leaderboards or play a range of games and worldrenowned courses. And then there are the

two teaching studios of the Matt Daley Golf Academy and fellow teaching pro Luke Bell, impressively spacious – nay, luxurious – hybrid facilities which can be temperature controlled enclosed rooms, or opened up to face the range itself. No wonder the pros are busy with around 70 lessons a week.

Out on the course itself, the original layout saw the introduction of some 5,000 native trees. Another 10,000 have been planted over the past two or three years, but Key insists these are more about overall aesthetics than to shape the golf course.

Burstwick has a Caravan Club camping site, but they are hoping to get planning permission to introduce holiday lodges and have been in talks with leading holiday park company Hoseasons on that front.

And beyond that....?

The 2nd has water cutting in from the left, plus Gaunt's archetypal bunkers, mounds and undulating greens Key laughs. "Well I'd like to re-do the clubhouse, turn it into a two-storey facility, but we've probably got enough on at the minute."

Indeed they have. Having thrived during lockdown – they put on 100 members in just a few months – Burstwick has now capped 7-day memberships at 600 with 58 names on the waiting list. There are 5-day memberships available and the club is actively trying to grow its 45-lady members.

Unlike many traditional golf clubs, membership dues work on a rolling 12-month basis. Join in July or December, renew in July and December. "It helps with cash flow," shrugs the boss. "Made sense to do it rather than load up on one particular date."

Drawing most of its membership from the east Hull area, an initial lossmaking annual Pro-Am venture has now come into its own, with everyone enjoying a top-quality day complete with impressive prize table. "We have 42 teams signed up for this year's event on Friday May 24th, playing for prizes worth £6.500 and £750 to the winning amateur team.

"As soon as we've enjoyed the day and got a date for the following year, I contact everyone and tell them I've reserved their tee time, if they're interested. About 80% say yes!"

It seems the passion for all things Burstwick is rubbing off in every which way.



BURSTWICK COUNTRY GOLF

Yellow Tees

1 – 312yds, par-4, SI 15 Slight downhill, dogleg right to left. Play for position with a bunkered elbow and more sand if you go straight and long. Big hitters can go over the corner but two front left bunkers await. One of the flatter greens but with run offs and mounds that are characteristic

2 - 378yds, par-4, SI 4

The fairways are generous here, but you have a very large pond running down your left, which cuts into the fairway about 75 yards from a slightly raised, undulating green which slopes back left to front right. Bunkers all sit below the putting surface.

3 – 297yds, par-4, SI 12 A gently rising straight hole with OB right and a right-side fairway bunker. The back to front sloping green has something of a back right shelf. As ever, traps abound!

4 - 419vds, par-4, SI 2

Out to the top corner of the course, generous fairway but OB still right. The hole rises before falling away slightly. If your second is blind beware the water hazard below left of a green which slopes from the back left but also falls away front left.

5 – 117yds, par-3, SI 16 A pretty, short par-3 to an elevated green with a shapely, deep front left bunker, one front right and another at the back to catch anything long. Good luck holding the green from there in summer, on a distinct back left to front right slope.

6 - 533yds, par-5, SI 8

Straight on, up-and-over but with a big fairway bunker slap bang in the middle. It will take a good knock to clear it. The hole falls away down to a flatter green protected by a pond in front. A good par-5.

7 - 405yds, par-4, SI 6

A long par-4 running back parallel with the 6th. Big fairway bunkers to both sides, before coming in slightly uphill to a big shaped green with an abundance of undulations and plenty of sand for protection.

8 - 225yds, par-3, SI 10

A mighty long par-3, especially into the prevailing wind with a big bunker in front, about 20-yards short of one of the flatter greens.

9 - 409yds, par-4, SI 1

Stroke index 1, a long par-4, a sharp dogleg right with traps on the elbow and a pond lurking a farther 25 yards on. Come in uphill to a well protected green which appears to slope off both back left and right. Tricky to read.

10 - 263yds, par-4, SI 18

Really nice looking from the tee, driveable in theory but those traps are pretty intimidating. Play in from the right side to another back to a big oval gently sloping green with the usual mounds and run offs.

11 - 314yds, par-4, SI 7

A slight dogleg with the last 70 yards coming in from the right side to a green sitting behind another pond. Too much zip on your ball in summer could draw it back into the water.

12 - 530yds, par-5, SI 5

A slight left to right shape, but favour the left side to avoid the lurking traps. There's plenty of width though. Beware the horseshoe-shaped bunker in front of one of the flatter (though none really are) greens. They're all pretty

13 - 266vds, par-4, SI 17

A driveable par-4 in good conditions, but again at the risk of taking on various jeapordies. Go for it if you have an A1 bunker game!

14 – 155yds, par-3, SI 13 A medium par-3, again inviting you to just hit the short grass and avoid the sand and run-offs.

15 - 319yds, par-4, SI 11

A straight on, shortish par-4. Fairway bunkers left but you can also find tree trouble on the right, before coming into a kidney-shaped back to front sloping green.

16 - 389yds, par-4, SI 3

A tough, dogleg left-to-right. A new plantation will deter big hitters from taking on the corner once it matures. A very large, gently undulating green, with a back bunker you might not see on your approach.

17 - 132yds, par-3, SI 14

A smaller par-3, just navigate the bunkers to find one of the flatter greens.

18 – 317yds, par-4, SI 9 Heading for home up the side of the driving range, which has OB stakes a yard inside it. There's a final water hazard in play down the left and which cuts into the fairway, though it can be carried. Not just the expected bunkers greenside but a couple of grass bunkers too.

NEW golf courses can match not just the quality but quantity of scenic beauty that envelopes anyone who visits Bentham Golf Club.

Surrounded by the Yorkshire Dales, Lake District and Forest of Bowland, Bentham, the imposing sight of Ingleborough looms over you as you wend your way around an undulating and always challenging 18-hole course.



An invitation to open your shoulders - the 18th tee at Stocksbridge

STOCKSBRIDGE GOLF CLUB

The course is best described as upland heath in its terrain and is relatively short by today's standards but is definitely not to be underestimated.

Do not be fooled by the distance! The small island greens, often surrounded by rough and a flat lie being a rarity makes it a challenge.

It's only a par 65 from the yellow tees but don't be thinking it's a pushover, if the wind is blowing especially on some of the par-3 holes the course will be playing closer to 70.

Stocksbridge Golf Club was formed in 1924. There were three pioneers-in-chief – L. Drabble, J Kilbride and H. Saxby. Three years previously the trio recognised the potential of the less wealthy inhabitants of Stocksbridge and the surrounding area and devised ways and means of bringing the Royal and Ancient game within the reach of the local people.

The course boasted among its attractions the Dragon's Well, where according to folklore, the Dragon of Wharncliffe slaked his thirst in days gone by, by flying across the valley from his lair on the Wharncliffe Crags.



The club started as a 9-hole course and was extended to 15-holes in 1982. The current 18-hole layout was completed in 1990.

Stocksbridge is situated 11miles north of the Sheffield city centre and only five miles from junction 36 of the M1, overlooking the village of Deepcar.

At its highest point 900m above sea level you can enjoy views of the Peak District

National Park to the west and the Lincolnshire Wolds to the east – a full 360 degree view from the top of the course spans 40 miles into the distance. And with the changes in elevation, Stocksbridge has some truly memorable driving holes



Continued from previous page golf in the White Rose county, just a 3-mile drive from junction 37 of the A1(M).

The club started life in 1909 with a modest 9-hole course, growing eventually into today's challenging 18-hole gem, unveiled in 1976 and crafted by the legendary Ryder Cup players, Neil Coles and Brian Huggett.

Over the decades, the club has honed and refined the course, making it one of the most sought-after golfing experiences in the region.

An undulating parkland track with tree-framed fairways, there are panoramic vistas across South Yorkshire and the eastern Pennines. As visitors have been heard to remark: "Hickleton offers a sublime golfing experience amidst awe-inspiring scenery."

SOUTH YORKSHIRE GOLF IN FOCUS

A 'pro' factory on the charge

It's not just fantastic golf courses and clubs that are a trademark of the South Yorkshire scene that is centred around Sheffield. The past few months have borne yet more testimony for the talent-factory that it continues to be. Joe Dean, the former Lindrick and

Joe Dean, the former Lindrick and Hillsborough golfer now attached to College Pines, made headlines a few weeks ago when he managed to take time off from working as a Morrison's delivery driver to bag a second place finish at the DP World Tour's Kenya Open and a handsome £170,000 cheque.

The 29-year-old winner of the 2016 English Amateur Championship at Alwoodley came through DP World Tour Qualifying in November alongside fellow South Yorkshireman Josh Berry (pictured right).

Doncaster's Berry also made the cut at the Kenya Open, finishing in a tie for 23rd and pocketing £18,200 for his best payday yet in his inaugural campaign. Alex Fitzpatrick (Hallamshire – now attached to Hollinwell) was a shot ahead on -7 his tie in 19th being worth £27,350.

Another South Yorkshireman, Hallowes' Sam Bairstow, missed the cut in Kenya, however it was the first time he'd missed the weekend after a streak of five consecutive cuts made, bagging £86,000 in the process.



Joe Dean went into the Nairobi field ranked world number 2,930 but finished joint 2nd behind Darius van Driel in Nairobi after a final day -4 took him to -12 for the tournament.

Describing it as "life-changing", he said: "It's what people dream of." The Sheffield man came through six rounds of final Q School at Infinitum in November, scraping

through in a tie for 22nd place. He didn't compete until the Qatar Masters in February as he could not afford to fund the travel. Dean missed the cut in Doha and returned to his job delivering for Morrisons, which he was doing as recently as the week before Kenya.

In Nairobi he found himself two shots behind eventual winner Van Driel after round one, then matched the Dutchman over the next three rounds to finish two back alongside Spaniard Nacho Elvira. The finish jumped him to 36th place on the Race to Dubai rankings.

"After the last three or four years I never thought I'd get another chance," he said, adding that he has "still some gremlins to get past in order to get to my full potential, but like anyone you've got to get over them, squash them and keep going.

"I've never been one of the most over-confi-

dent people – coming into this week was a bit daunting. Second event, you don't really feel like you belong and feel like you're trying to prove something.

"Luckily, I managed to get over that quickly and figure out how to get around the golf course"

After winning the English Amateur he earned a place in the 146th Open at Royal Birkdale in 2017 where he made the cut.

A fallow few years saw him make just two appearances on the main tour in 2019 before he came through this year's qualifying with a tie for 9th place at Donnington Grove Golf Club, before a morale-boosting 2nd at Las Pinaillas to earn his spot at final qualifying.

Meanwhile closer to home, word on the grapevine is that Morrisons have a vacancy for a delivery driver...

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

It's been a remarkable experience for the York Golf Club member, which has both opened doors and opened eyes - in the world of disability golf and indeed, sport. On the way he has raised thousands of pounds for Parkinsons charities, and aims to go out with a fanfare at his home club on Thursday April 4.

Speaking after playing 'walking football' with a group of York-area Parkinsons sufferers he said: "I'm doing well at the moment. A bit stiff in the legs but I'm still managing to get out every day, either to play a round or go up the range to hit 50 to a hundred balls when the course is closed."

The end of February saw Tony



mark 1,056 days of golf involving 1,240 rounds, but that includes about 40 days when courses have been closed. In his efforts to get out playing he's travelled to to Selby, Forest Pines, Darrington and up to the Scottish Borders to

get a game .
"The main thing is I'm getting

physical exercise and I'm not worried about the tremor for however long it takes. Like with the walking football today, you're moving about, you're focussed on the game. The streak goes on \dots in some ways I'm looking forward to April 4th more than I thought I would be. I need a physical rest or a good massage - one or the other.

"I've done pilates occasionally with my wife, but that's starting to be affected by my balance issues which are creeping in. I'm still doing other sports, bowling indoors twice a week in the winter, three times outdoor - hopefully!

"Health wise I'm still quite positive about things. I know it's not going to get any better. To repeat the analogy, I know I'm not going to win the war but there are still plenty battles I can win."

Once past the three year target, Tony is staging a charity day of

fourball betterball golf at Strensall on April 4, with a range of auction prizes including a fourball with former Scotland and Lions captain Gavin Hastings at his Gullane club. Other items donated include a signed shirt from football star Luca Modric, Lee Westwood and Paul Lawrie signed shirts, plus 10 to 15 fourballs at clubs around Yorkshire.

And once the pressure of playing every single day is off, Tony is looking forwards to a holiday with long-suffering wife Ann.

Letter to the Editor In a fix over hole rims...

Sir, I read with interest Danny Lockwood's article about the new WHS changes and agree totally with his opinion.

I wonder if he or anyone else can get an explanation from the R&A regarding plastic hole supports/rims not being allowed for handicap qualifiers during

I submitted messages twice via their website but never received a reply.

It beggars belief that these make any significant difference to a player's score but are an essential piece of kit to help maintain the integrity of hole shape on many courses during the winter months. I suspect those making the decisions all play at high class clubs and/or at links venues where it isn't an issue. But the vast majority of us play very wet park-land type courses which are severely impacted in the wet.

It beggars belief that you can allow placing, take all bunkers out of play, even have up to two temporary greens and maintain handicap qualifying but a plastic hole support, no chancel

I'd be delighted if you could take this matter up with them and report in a future issue of your fine publication. NEIL BROMLEY HILLSBOROUGH GOLF CLUB (FORMER GREENS CHAIRMAN)

YG put the query to YUGC Secretary Jonathan Plaxton who believed use of rims was meant purely for environments where the 'soil' couldn't ustain the shape adequately. He checked with Ruth Goodwin, whose reply follows:

I did have a discussion with the R&A with regard to the plastic hole inserts. The only ones I have come across are those which are for use in an unstable environment (such as a desert) where the composition of the 'soil' makes it impossible for a 'hole' to be cut and remain in any way stable.
There is no Local Rule which allows for

the dimensions of a 'hole' to be altered, or the placing of an insert to be anything other than 1 inch below the surface of the putting green; unless the nature of the soil requires it to be closer. All this is described under the definition of 'Hole in the Rules of Golf.

Sam Bairstow (Hallowes) won The Brabazon at Ganton in 2021, while Rotherham's Ben Schmidt won it at Alwoodley in 2019, lifting the English Boys' Carris Trophy the same year, and Nick Poppleton (Wath) was champion the year before at Frilford Heath

Escape to superb SOMABAY Yorkshire Golfer Publisher DANNY LOCKWOOD escaped a rain-sodden English February to sample the delights of Egypt's best-kept secret on a secluded Red Sea peninsula...

omabay is a self-contained luxury resort on a Red Sea peninsula, about a 30 minute drive south of the popular tourist destination of Hurghada, in Egypt.

It is, to summarise succinctly, absolutely fabulous. I could live in Somabay. Seriously. Golf is very much at the heart of what

Somabay is about, but it's far from being 'just' a golf destination. Mrs L was celebrating a

landmark birthday and wanted somewhere with guaranteed sun and warmth which, in the first week of February, basically rules out

With midday temperatures in the mid-20s celsius – there's almost always a sea breeze – pleasantly cool evenings, but importantly a brand new golf facility for me to explore, it ticked every box.

The birthday girl doesn't golf but galloping a pony along a sunlit beach, with a stunning mountain backdrop, created an even greater impression than the unbelievable sights while snorkelling on the nearby reef.

Neither of us were moved to try the very F1-looking 700-metre go kart track just outside the Somabay Marina; likewise the scuba diving, kite-surfing or various other waterbased activities which includes golfing at sea, hitting from a party boat onto a floating green. You use real golf balls – then snorkel to retrieve them.

The Sports Hub has four Wimbledon-quality tennis courts (the home of tennis's agronomists were consulted) plus squash courts, paddle-ball courts, while an Olympic-sized pool and running track is under construction plus a professional-level football field to attract Academy business. This is sporting heaven.

I had played Somabay's Gary Player Championship course some years ago and it has been finessed somewhat. It is an excellent test which can stretch itself to almost 7,000 yards from the back tees. The 6,468 blue tees were quite enough for me.

Several holes running beside the sea are deliberately crafted to give you a distinct feel of Pebble Beach. I defy anyone not to take out their phone and snap some photos.

But winding inland towards the imposing mountains, the wind comes

into play from every possible direction. The sandy waste areas – think Dubai Desert Classic – are immaculately kept and the fairways and greens were as pure as any I can remember playing. Dynasty Paspalum and Kikuyu grasses, apparently.

Indeed the Clutch Pro Tour is due to take a Pro-Am event to Somabay between April 17-

22 and all I can say is that they are in for a treat. This is a destination that deserves a 'Big League' profile. Right now Somabay's main tourist business is from Germany and mainland Europe, but with Egypt's second language being English, it is crying out to surface on more Brits' radar.

This part of the world is very arid, but a mix of recycled 'grey' water, desalination and a large solar field outside the resort tick the environmental boxes

On course the par-3 5th (among several others) would qualify as anyone's signature hole, with the green jutting out into the Red Sea and the prospect of playing from the sand or rocks sitting below it on three sides (tip – bail out left!)

For a bit of fun, the 12th – Double Dilemma – has a waste area straight down the centre of the hole, with fairways left and right before going into an elevated green. Take your pick.

On my visit more golfers walked than rode buggies, although there are a few quite lengthy walks between greens and tees. That said, it just allows more time to soak in the stunning views. There is an awful lot of building underway in distinct 'village' settings around the 10 million square metre estate, but there is also a new Tim Lobb/James Edwards-designed 18-hole championship-level course under construction.

All of that however, strictly speaking, was-n't what I had come to report on – it was the new and stunning 'Scoring Arena'. What's one of those?





"It's one-of-a-kind," according to Business Development Director Mohammed Attallah, a senior figure in Egyptian sport who studied at Manchester University. Think of a short game area on steroids.

"It's quite a size, some 5,000 square metres," he explained. "There are 27 distinct scoring zones which provide basically every short game shot you can imagine. Chip and run shots with different breaks to read, flop shots over bunkers, both from above and below, grass bunkers – five types of bunkers in all – all the zones with a variety of flags on them ... think of any short game challenge and we believe you'll find it here.

"The owners – who also have the excellent Costa Navarino in

"The owners – who also have the excellent Costa Navarino in Greece – basically gave the designers carte blanche to dream!"

The Scoring Arena is floodlit, as is the neighbouring 9-hole par-3 course which, very cleverly, incorporates a Footgolf course within it. It's a par-3 layout which allows players to hit from a variety of yardages, with 10-yard lines marked out working back from the green.

To the other side of the Scoring Arena is a 300-yard long, dualended driving range with both grass and artificial hitting areas, also floodlit

And just for good measure, a new sports bar on the highest part of the estate overlooks an island green with a distinct look of the iconic 17th par-3 at TPC Sawgrass. Golf Operations Manager Mo Ramadan laughed when he saw the look on my face – a hole-in-one challenge, with mats in front of the open-air bar to hit from. Someone hand me a club!

The Somabay resort is self-contained in that visitors drive from the main Hurghada road across desert and through a security station, before entering the estate. There are four major hotels by the Red Sea, the Kempinski, Sheraton, Robinsons and The Breakers – very much for the watersport buffs, adjacent to the Orca Diving Centre.

A second Robinson's adults-only hotel and dedicated 'Sports Hotel' are in the planning pipeline.

A seaside shuttle runs regularly along the beach side to the Marina, with its array of shops and restaurants, including the excellent Sobar restaurant and rooftop cocktail bar. Sunsets in this part of the world are spectacular.

The main golf hotel, lying at the heart of the Gary Player Championship course and a regular shuttle ride from its own private beach, is The Cascades. It has a range of packages including half-board and all-inclusive, plus a huge, award-winning Spa and Thelasso, which is worth a day's wire in treaff

and Thalasso, which is worth a day's visit in itself.

After a 'hard' day's golf a spell in the 14-station Aquatonic pool is a delight. Powerful water jets work every part of your body, from the soles of your feet to the top of your head, before you lay back and enjoy a relaxing floating swirl around a fast moving pool.

There is a separate jacuzzi by the main pool with an adjacent gym and fitness room which incorporates separate sauna and steam rooms for men and women guests.

The Cascades' main restaurant overlooks the 9th and 18th greens, while above it the Eagles Nest is a traditional English-style pub, complete with a (free to use) pool table.

Next to the gym and pool is Spikes Bar and Restaurant which serves as both a '19th' for the golfers and lunch/afternoon drinks spot for guests.

Cascades has a beach shuttle which runs every 10 minutes and quite besides the luxurious cabanas on the private beach, there is the Sea Shell bar and restaurant. As with pretty much everything at Somabay, every single box seems to be ticked.

For travellers who don't want the full hotel experience, the resort has its own Airbnbstyle business called Stayr, with everything from one-bed apartments to luxury villas complete with pool.

In the immortal words of The Terminator Arnold Schwarzenegger, "I'll be back..."











Landmark Anniversary English Amateur staged in 150th birthday year

Stage is set for huge year at Seaton Carew



Where nature meets industry – huge greens and devilish bunkers at Seaton Carew

It promises to be a momentous and memorable year at Seaton Carew Golf Club, as it prepares to host the English Amateur Championship in what is its landmark 150th anniversary year.

The Teesside links is the 10th oldest course in the country, founded as it was by Scottish doctor Duncan McCuaig when he came to practise in the area, and which rose to real prominence when another doctor – Alister MacKenzie no less – basically uprooted the old course and moved it closer to the dunes of Tees Bay.

As frustrated golfers find their courses closed due to an unprecedented winter of constant rain, there's been no such problem at Seaton Carew.

As secretary Roy Leonard explained: "Business is absolutely booming at the moment – I'm touching wood – but with the weather being as it is and how it's affected most inland courses, because we're so fortunate to have fast draining fairways and greens I think we've only closed for a couple of days when we had snow and ice."

"It's been quite a balancing act trying to ensure our members can play but trying to fit visitors in around them."

There have been areas of flooding, but the club has the luxury of extra holes which allows it to configure several different layouts – the game goes on.

"We're finding parts of our course under water which is unusual, but of course we're lucky in that we can change the layout."

Seaton Carew will partner with Hartlepool Golf Club for the English Amateur Championship [July 30 – August 4] with strokeplay qualifying over the first two days, before the knockout stages focus on Seaton Carew's Micklem course.

"England Golf were here in January and they walked the course and were more than happy with it, they feel it's a good challenging layout," said Mr Leonard. "We tend to play the Micklem probably nine months of the year.

"We've been working towards this for the past three or four years, since England Golf awarded us the Championship. We've put in a new back tee on the 14th, but have had a programme of renovating and trying to bring a lot of our bunkers back to the original MacKenzie style, so much more natural than the pristine, contoured things that you have on most courses.

"We work alongside MacKenzie and Ebert and they've been able to get hundreds of old photographs going back as far as the 1930s, which gives us an idea of how they've changed. It was only 1926 when MacKenzie made the changes here. Bunkers and greens have changed so we're working towards trying to reintroduce some of that original MacKenzie feel."

Seaton Carew is proud of its affordability, given its status as a premium links course, and that's reflected in its popularity. The club has a waiting list for membership of over 100 and has had notification of only a handful of golfers leaving the club. It has introduced a modest £250 joining fee.

Similarly the club's Festival Week – this year put back to the first week of September – has long been oversubscribed and there's a waiting list for the Seniors Salver.

Regarding the big anniversary, Mr Leonard explained: "We have a very full calendar of events anyway, so we're focussing on a one day celebration [on Saturday July 6th] with an anniversary competition followed by a barbecue and band.

"There's also the introduction of a new Ladies Salver to complement the long-standing Seaton Salver.

"We're having a hickory club Texas Scramble on the 6th of June to highlight how much golf has changed over 150 years, and encourag.

ing people to dress in period costume."

In a year of anniversaries – it is also England Golf's centenary – there's another 'big' day in prospect.

"We have an annual home and



away match with Brancepeth Castle, which we found out was originally set up by a few of our members. So we've had a long relationship playing what we call 'the Big Match' and this year it's their centenary, so we'll make a bit of a do of the Big

Match, which is in August – a few days after the English Amateur."

All in all, there is an exciting year in prospect for everyone associated with Seaton Carew and one thing is pretty much for sure – rain will not stop play!
